LINN COUNTY 4-H/FFA FAIR General Rules and Regulations

The Linn County Fair is for everyone's benefit and enjoyment. Each club or chapter is to furnish workers (youth and adult) at the beginning clean up and clean up following the fair. These workers will need to bring hoses, brooms, dust pans, shovels, rags, buckets, hammers, nails and other necessary equipment to prepare the fairgrounds for a week of activities. Livestock pens will be chosen following the completion of first day clean up.

Entries and events during the fair are limited to boys and girls enrolled in 4-H clubs in Linn County, enrolled in a FFA chapter in Linn County or live in Linn County and are enrolled in a FFA chapter in a surrounding county.

Clover Kid members (those under the age of 8 on January 1) may exhibit non-livestock entries but are not eligible for premium money or State Fair selection.

All classes in the Linn County Fair are to be judged according to the Danish System. Each entry will be classified: BLUE, RED, WHITE or UNCLASSIFIED.

Point value is assigned to the ribbons in each class. The value of the point will be determined by the Fair Board on the basis of the total money available for premiums.

To be eligible to show or exhibit and receive premium money, Linn County 4-H **For 2020** – 4-H members must communicate to project leaders and club leaders how they are staying involved in their club and projects be it remotely or through assigned activities that can be done at home.

Those exhibitors who show marketable animals (beef, sheep, swine, rabbit, poultry, goat), 4-H and FFA, must have the proper MO Show Me Quality certification in order to exhibit at the Linn County Fair. This must be completed by June 15 of the current year.

Everyone's help is needed to have a good fair. Your help is especially needed in the Concession Stand and Work Day/Clean Up. Plans are for Ribbon Premium and Premium Sale Checks to be give out at Cleanup day following the fair.

Achievement Day exhibits (Building Exhibits) by any one 4-H club member or FFA chapter member are **limited to three per class**. Livestock entries by any one club or chapter member are unlimited unless specifically stated in the premium list. However, not more than two cash awards will be paid to any livestock exhibitor in any one class. Special rules and regulations are stated in the premium lists which are to apply to a particular division.

Every precaution will be taken to protect the exhibits but neither the 4-H Council nor the Fair Board will be responsible for any losses or damage to exhibits.

All Building Exhibits will be pre-entered in the Fair Entry program (https://www.fairentry.com). Exhibit tags will then be printed and available for pick up on the fairgrounds during Clean Up Day or just ahead of Exhibit Judging. All exhibits must be made by the 4-H member in a 4-H project in which he or she is currently enrolled. FFA entries must be part of their current FFA program.

Non-exhibitors must leave the fairgrounds within one hour of the close of the evening program.

ANY USE OF ALCOHOL DURING THE FAIR, on property or in facilities, is prohibited. Violators and their families will also be asked to remove all their exhibits and to leave the fairgrounds. Violators and their families also forfeit the privilege of participation in the premium sale and all family ribbon premium money will be withheld.

Vandalism of any sort to exhibits or property (destruction of other's livestock, exhibits or fair buildings) will not be tolerated. Action will be taken on participant(s) involved by way of forfeit of premium money, giving up of sale privileges and not being allowed to exhibit the next year. Parents could be held responsible for their children's actions.

DRESS Code: Fair Exhibitors are required to wear the current year's Linn County Fair Exhibitors shirt while exhibiting in fair events and while participating in the Awards Night and Premium Sale at the Linn County Fair, unless a previous dress code exists for their event. Exhibitors must represent a wholesome and appropriate image.

Home Economics, Agriculture

(Other than Livestock)

All exhibits shall be entered according to the club or chapter schedule. Self-evaluation of each member's exhibits will take place at that time. During self-evaluation judging of Home Economics exhibits, **ONLY** the **JUDGE, HELPER** and **EXHIBITOR** shall be present.

Style Revue garments will be released for the scheduled revue program but should be returned with exhibit ribbons and tags immediately following the Revue.

At the end of the Fair, all State Fair exhibits should be taken home and returned at a later date for transport to Sedalia (State Fair). (If an exhibitor has more than two items chosen to go to State Fair, the exhibitor will have to choose which two items they want to send.) State 4-H Office will let Clover Kid members what day they can take items for the day to the State Fair

Agriculture Livestock

If health papers are required they will need to be checked by division chairmen. Health papers must remain on the premises during the fair.

Showmanship: For those who are enrolled in livestock projects and must have shown their own respective animals in regular show classes before a showmanship class – exceptions need to be approved by the species chairman. Junior - Age 8-13 as of January 1 of the current year and has not previously won the award. Senior - Anyone not eligible for Junior Showmanship may show for Senior Showmanship if the member has not previously won that title. (No person may win Junior or Senior more than once each.) Advanced Showmanship – anyone who has won Junior and Senior Showman and otherwise not eligible to show in showmanship. Alumni Shows – for those 22 and older that have shown in the past.

All livestock must be shown by the owner or manager except for special permission of the chairman of the division. In case a club or chapter owner/member has two entries in the same class, he may have another 4-H or FFA member assist him. If a 4-H or FFA member is being assisted by another member and the animal being shown is by the owner/member is retired from the ring the owner/member shall exchange animals with the assistant and shall remain in the show ring with the assistant retiring.

Exhibitors are not permitted to show the same breed in both the 4-H and FFA divisions. For example, if an exhibitor shows Chester White hogs as a 4-H member, he/she cannot show Chester White hogs as a FFA member or if an exhibitor shows market steers as FFA he/she cannot show market steers as 4-H. For those who have an affiliation of 4-H in one county and FFA in another they can only show their project category in one county or the other. (Same animal cannot be shown as 4-H and FFA both).

• Hay, straw, bedding, feed, buckets, troughs and forks are to be provided by the exhibitor. Bedding, free to exhibitors, will be on the fairgrounds that can be used in all barns. Any bedding used in the Hog Barn – exhibitors must clean their pens in order to receive premium money.

- The Fair Board will supply hurdles when needed.
- All animals must enter grounds on Wednesday and stay until Saturday (3:00 5:00 release time) that will be shown during the fair. Following their specific show with permission from livestock division chairmen and proof of entry in another show, one may leave the fairgrounds to attend another show EXCEPT for Grand and Reserve Champions and/or animal going through the sale.
- All champion livestock and trophy-winning livestock will be presented trophies as they are selected.
- Individual showmanship trophies will be given in Beef, Dairy, Swine, Sheep and Goats.
- Previous sale of a steer, wether or barrow: once a market animal has been offered for sale or is sold ... **IT IS NOT** allowed to show at the Missouri State Fair unless an advanced sale agreement is signed and on record.

NO UNETHICAL or IN-HUMANE TREATMENT OF ANIMALS WILL BE TOLERATED. Violators and their families will be asked to remove all their exhibits and to leave the fairgrounds. Violators and their families also forfeit the privilege of participation in the premium sale and forfeit all family premium money.

** New 2018** LIVESTOCK FITTING:

Each 4-H/FFA member shall take responsibility for caring for and grooming his/her own animal(s). If assistance is needed it should be intended to help the 4-H/FFA member learn new skills. The member must be present and actively engaged in grooming their animal for the show. 4-H Members can be assisted by fellow 4-H/FFA members, project/club leaders, FFA advisors and family members. Family members consist of parents, siblings, grandparents, aunts, uncles and legal guardians. Anyone found in violation of this rule will be disqualified.

All livestock are subject to vet inspection at the request of chairman. More specific rules are listed with each division or category. State Fair rules will apply for situations not covered in this publication.

Ownership/Management means in possession of member and member responsible for care of animal(s). Exception situations must be approved by the Fair Board, by the member (4-H or FFA) personally attending the Fair Board meeting before the given ownership/management dates.

1. Thou shall NOT feed, train, and care for the animal...for you are trying to teach children responsibility.

2. Thou shall forgive a child for making mistakes in the showring...for you have made mistakes too.

3. Thou shall NOT get mad when the child forgets items in the showbox...for one day you might forget the whole showbox.

4. Thou shall help the show management. They are doing a good job at a job you would not want to do.

5. Thou shall see that your child is on time for all show activities, for you would not want to wait on another.

6. Thou shall be sure that your child has the animals entered and the registration papers in order at the designated time.

7. Thou shall teach the child that winning a blue ribbon is a desirable goal, but making friends along the way is a much more worthy goal.

8. Thou shall NOT complain about the judge, for it is his opinion that has been sought that day.

9. Thou shall remember that livestock projects are teaching projects...not necessarily money-making projects.

10. Thou shall remember that the livestock project is a family project that should be enjoyed and supported by the entire family.

SPECIAL EVENTS

ARTS & CRAFTS AWARD

Any 4-H member enrolled in A Palette of Fun (#AC311) project is eligible for this award First preference will be given to a Chalk, Carbon or Pigment exhibit. That exhibit must be free hand and mounted (ready to hang or display). If there is no first preference exhibit, then the award will go to the most creative and unique exhibit.

ADVANCED ARTS & CRAFTS AWARD

Any 4-H member enrolled in Advanced Arts & Craft (#AC312- & #AC313) project is eligible for this award. First preference will be given to a Chalk, Carbon or Pigment exhibit. That exhibit must be free hand and mounted (ready to hang or display). If there is no first preference exhibit eligible then the award will go to the creative and unique exhibit.



BEGINNING WOODWORKING AWARD

Any 4-H member enrolled in Woodworking Unit 1 (#WO871) who is 13 and younger and has not won this award before is eligible to enter an item. The exhibit will be judged on workmanship and creativity.

ADVANCED WOODWORKING AWARD

Any 4-H member enrolled in Woodworking other that Unit 1 (#WO872, #WO872, #WO873, #WO874) is eligible to enter an item. The exhibit will be judged on workmanship and creativity.

BEGINNING PHOTOGRAPHY AWARD

Any 4-H member enrolled in Photography Unit 1 (#PH351) project is eligible for this award. This award shall be given to the best photo exhibit of a member who has not won the award before. Criteria used will include composition, utilization of photographic techniques and overall appeal.

ADVANCED PHOTOGRAPHY AWARD

Any 4-H member enrolled in Photography Unit 2 or 3 (#PH352, #PH353) project is eligible for this award. This award shall be given to the best photo exhibit of a member who has not won the award before. Criteria used will include composition, utilization of photographic techniques and overall appeal.

BEGINNING GARMENT AWARD

Only 4-H members enrolled in Beginning Clothing #CL521 are eligible to enter. The item (s) must be a wearable garment that has a casing, straight seam and a hem.

ADVANCED GARMENT AWARD

Any 4-H member enrolled in Advanced Clothing projects #CL522 and #CL523 is eligible to enter an item. The exhibit will be judged on workmanship and intricate construction.





BEST TAILORED GARMENT CONTEST

A tailored garment is one that is fitted with a permanently established shape.

- 4-H members enrolled in Clothing Levels using tailoring techniques are eligible for this award. At least two

 tailoring techniques must be used in the garment (set-in sleeves, interfacing, buttonholes, shoulder pads, etc.) and be lined. Only one entry per member may be entered.
- 2) Entry must be made by the 4-H member during the current year.
- 3) All entries will be judged following their judging in their respective exhibit classes.
- 4) Members trying for this award must appear with their garment in the Fair Style Revue.
- 5) Previous winners are not eligible.

STYLE REVUE



1) Any current 4-H member enrolled in a Clothing project this year is eligible to enter the Style Revue at the Fair.

2) You are not required to enter the Revue, but if you do enter, the garment you wear MUST be one you have made this year in a 4-H Clothing project and MUST be exhibited at the Fair. You may take your garment from the exhibits on the night of the Revue, but all garments should be returned to the exhibit area with their ribbon and tag, immediately following the Revue. Prizes will be given to those taking part.

3) To enter the Revue you must fill out a Style Revue blank and return it to the Fair Office on Monday of the Fair. If you find later you are unable to take part in the Revue, you may cancel your entry. If you cannot participate, please let the person in charge know!!



BEGINNING QUILT AWARD

Any 4-H member ages 9-12 enrolled in Quilting 1, 2 or 3 (#QU341, #QU342, #QU343) is eligible to enter an item. Winner will be chosen from those who have not previously won this award.

ADVANCE QUILT AWARD

Any a 4-H member ages 13-18 enrolled in Quilting 4, 5, 6 (#QU 344, #QU345, #QU346) is eligible to enter an item. Winner will be chosen from those who have not won this award.

CHERRY PIE BAKING CONTEST



- 1) All 4-H/FFA members exhibiting at the fair may enter the Cherry Pie Baking Contest (Class #584). Pies are to be checked in and judged during exhibit judging.
- 2) The entry, made by 4-H/FCCLA member must be a two crust cherry pie. The
- type of crust and design may be chosen by the exhibitor. <u>ONLY ONE ENTRY</u> per exhibitor. Commercial pie filling is not acceptable.
- 3) Special awards will be given to the TOP 3 BLUE RIBBON entries. Only blue ribbon entries are eligible for the awards.
- 4) Pies will be judged on Danish System. Point value is 12-8-6. Judge will taste one slice.
- 5) After the judging, a sample slice will be displayed (second slice) and the rest of the pie sold through the fair concession stand or taken home.

BEST OVERALL HOME ECONOMICS EXHIBIT

- 1) All exhibits from clubs/chapters in these projects will be used in judging: Breads, Cake Decorating, Child Development, Clothing, Crochet, Foods, Food Preservation, Gardening, Home Environment, Horticulture, Knitting, Quilting, Woodworking (household items).
- 2) A plaque will be awarded at recognition program.
- 3) Home Economics Plaque score card is as follows:

Quality of Exhibits - 25%, Number of Exhibits - 25%, Percentage of Members Exhibiting - 25%, Cleanliness, Attractiveness, Neatness of Exhibits - 25%, Total - 100%

4) To be presented at the county Recognition Program

FOOD PRESERVATION AWARD

A panel of judges will select the best entry in each category for Fruits, Vegetables, Pickles, and Soft Spreads categories. Entries must be preserved in Ball Classic, Collection Elite, or Heritage Collection Jars sealed with Ball Classic, Collection Elite, or Heritage Collection lids and Bands, or preserved in Kerr Jars sealed with Kerr Lids and Bands. In addition, soft spread entries must be prepared using Ball Pectin; Classic, Low or No-Sugar, or Liquid.



OUTSTANDING FOODS AWARD

To be awarded to the judge's choice of food entries from any project (Foods, Microwave, International Foods). To be presented at the Awards program during the fair.



HERDSMANSHIP

Club Herdsmanship will be awarded in Beef, Bucket Calf, Goat, Poultry, Rabbit, Sheep and Swine at recognition program. Awards will be based on the following during the fair:

Display including attractiveness and identification of club affiliation of owner(s).
 Cleanliness, including care of exhibit area, animals and appearance of exhibitor.

3) Sportsmanship and cooperative attitude of exhibitors.

4) Clean up following the fair.

OUTSTANDING WELDING



To be awarded to the best welding exhibit from a 4-H or FFA member entered at the fair.

Outstanding Beef Award

A county high point Beef Award to be given at recognition program. It will be based on the highest number of accumulated points won by an individual at the Linn County 4-H/FFA Fair in the Beef Female, Bull and Steer Shows. Points are based on 3 for a blue ribbon, 2 for a red and 1 for a white. In case of a tie, the individual with the highest number of championship honors will break the tie.



Fair Royalty

A King, Queen, Prince and Princess will be selected each year from nominations of each club in the county. Each club may select ONE BOY and ONE GIRL age 13 and under and ONE BOY and ONE GIRL age 14 and older as of January 1 of the current year.

Prince and Princess Candidates will fill out an application online, attach a school picture, but have no interview.

King and Queen Candidates will fill out an application online, attach a school picture, and have a personal interview. The score card used for King and Queen Candidates will be 100 points for 4-H record and 50 points for interview (poise/posture, personal appearance, personality, communication skills, quality of answers). Business professional dress is appropriate, such as slacks, shirt and tie for the boys and a dress for the girls. You want to dress modestly as points may be deducted for personal appearance. King and Queen interviews will be held at the Linn County Fairgrounds (Brookfield, MO) on:

Sunday, June 28th at 2:00 pm.

All applications must be filled out online and are due on or before June 5 June 15 (extended due to club meeting restrictions). The application form is available www.linncofair.com. If you can't access the application call the Extension Office for help – 660-895-5123. Submit your 4-H Royalty Application (typed) by emailing it to linnco@missouri.edu. A *headshot photo* of the candidate is *required* with the submission of the application. The application and headshot photo must be submitted at the same time on the same email (they will be two different email attachments).

Instructions: Upon clicking on the Royalty Application button, you will need to download a copy of the PDF to your computer. After opening the pdf file on your computer, you will be able to add text to the boxes of the form. If you don't download it, you will not be able to add your information to the file. The candidate will be able to save and edit his/her text as they work through the application (as long as it is saved in between times of working on the application).

Attention Queen Candidates: To be eligible for the Missouri state Fair Queen Contest you must be age 17 by September 1.

A candidate cannot be awarded Fair King or Queen AND FFA Ambassador in the same year.

4-H and FFA Royalty are expected to dress appropriately at ALL functions they attend. This would include interviews, the crowning of the royalty and events during the 4-H/FFA Fair. Announcing of royalty candidates and winners will be on:

Saturday – July 11th at the Fairgrounds at 7:00 pm. All candidates must be present by 6:45 pm.



SHOOTING SPORTS CONTESTS General Rules

- 1. **Entry Requirements** 4-H members will be considered eligible to participate in the Linn County 4-H Shooting Sports Match if they, and the county program, meet these requirements.
 - a. 4-H'er must have completed safety requirements as read in the <u>Clover</u>

1. Completed #740 Firearm Safety – 6 hours before any practices.

- b. 4-H'er's must have attended at least six community club meetings within the 4-H year.
- c. 4-H'er's must have received a minimum of eight contact teaching hours with a certified leader.
- d. 4-H'er's must present a copy of the state health form (found on 4honline.com/reports/health form)

to certified instructors which they will keep in a notebook event practices.

- e. FFA'ers must be "in good standing" with their respective Chapter Advisor.
- f. FFA'er must fill out 4-H Form Y640, Youth Health Statement, Parent Consent, and Event Acceptance form.
- g. 4-H Certified Leaders **MUST** see FFA members attend at least **two** practices before the contest event to better know their safety skills.
- h. State 4-H Shooting Sports Team members must attend at least 2 (two) meetings and let the county instructor know they are on the team.
- i. Completed Registration forms must be turned in by July 1st, or a \$25.00 per event late fee will be assessed.
- 2. **SAFETY IS ALWAYS THE PRIMARY CONSIDERATION.** Any violations of accepted safety rules are grounds for immediate disqualification. NO WARNING REQUIRED! Each contestant, parent, or coach on the firing line will wear appropriate eye and/or ear protection for all shooting events. NO OPEN TOED SHOES (no flip flops or sandals)
 - a. **Eye Protection:** Shooting glasses or equivalent prescription glasses are required for all events involving air or powder driven projectiles. They are strongly recommended (but not required) for archery events as well. ISU or UIT glasses may be worn only if both eyes are adequately protected. All persons on or near the firing line are required to have eye protection, including coaches, range personnel, and shooters.
 - b. **Ear Protection:** In any event where noise is a recognized hazard to future hearing (i.e. if it goes "bang") then hearing protection is required of all persons on or near the ranges. Ear plugs or head style ear muffs may be worn at the discretion of the shooter, range officer or coach; but proper hearing protection is required. Audio headphones or ear buds –even if not plugged in are not acceptable hearing protection. Such equipment may be used in air or archery events if the shooter desires, but BB, Pellet, and Archery do not require hearing protection.
 - c. **Finger tabs, shooting gloves or releases required:** All archery participants are required to use some type of finger protection. No bare fingers will be allowed!
 - d. **Cased Requirement:** All firearms, air guns, and bows, must be in a case at all times except when on the range and ready to participate in the event.
 - e. **Open and Empty:** All firearms will remain open and empty until the shooter is on the range and the command to load or fire, is given.

- f. Safe Indicators: Safety Procedure for Air Pistol, Air Rifle, BB Gun, Small Bore Rifle, Small Bore Pistol

 while in the case and when brought to the firing line. Air rifles and air pistols shall have a weed eater string (of bright color) in the barrel and protruding a minimum of six inches out of the muzzle and out of the action (Clear barrel indicator-CBI). Small Bore rifles and pistols should use some type of Open Bolt Indicators (OBI). BB guns should use the weed eater string, if possible however, for the Daisy 499 and other muzzle loading BB guns that may not be possible.
- g. Muzzle Control: Shooters must maintain control of their muzzles at all times. Firearms must be carried in the muzzle up position whenever uncased on the range unless the action is hinged and broken open. Regardless of condition, muzzles may not be pointed toward or rested upon any part of the body of the shooter or another person. This includes the use of toe pads in the shotgun games. Violation of this rule may result in a warning, disqualification from a round, or disqualification from a match.
- **h. NO Practice shots:** There shall be no shooting of bows or firearms anywhere on the event grounds (parking lots, empty lot, etc.) except during actual competition on the official firing lines or in practice without a certified instructor present. **This is strictly prohibited and could result in disqualification.**
- i. Uncasing Equipment: No equipment can be uncased without a certified instructor present.
- j. Audio headphones or ear pieces'/ear buds and cell phones are not permitted on the firing line or the field. Once an individual or team is called to compete, ear pieces or headphones must be removed and remain off during the competition. Spectators should also be sensitive to the shooters and turn off ringtones when near the competition.
- k. **Range check:** Officials have the right to check all firearms and archery equipment prior to OR during its use in competition to determine that it meets qualifications and/or that it is safe. Equipment determined to be unsafe will not be allowed on the range.
- 3. Contestants are responsible for providing their own shooting equipment and accessories, including safety glasses, ear protection, finger tabs and quivers. Official targets and score cards (if required) are provided.
- 4. Three competition age classes or divisions are recognized. Participants must compete within their own age group per specified age range. Age is as of January 1 of the year of the event.
 - a. JUNIOR: Ages 8-10 (NO junior division in shotgun events, small Bore pistol, or muzzle loading)
 - b. **INTERMEDIATE:** Ages 11-13 (NO BB gun events or small Bore pistol)
 - c. SENIOR: Ages 14 and older- Senior (No BB gunevents)
- 5. **Coaches/spotters** Use of an adult coach or spotter on the firing line is allowed BUT within guidelines. Check the rules of each event for the current information about use of spotters or coaches. Older youth (senior age division) may be used as a spotter/coach...where applicable.

For Small Bore Rifle, Air Rifle, BB Gun, and Air Pistol: One coach or spotter must accompany the Juniorage shooter to the firing line. A coach/spotter may accompany an Intermediate-age shooter to the firing line. Senior shooters may not have a coach/spotter on the firing line with them. The primary responsibility of the coach/spotter will be to assure that safety rules are always observed. The spotter or coach may assist the shooter within the guidelines listed below:

- a. JUNIOR May verbally and physically assist the shooters between relays and during the sight-in period, including load and/or cock of the gun (must always keep muzzle pointing downrange).
- b. INTERMEDIATE Spotting shots and verbal assistance only...unless shooter asks & receives permission from the range officer for coach's assistance.
- c. SENIOR No assistance –even verbal- of any kind unless shooter asks & receives permission from the range officer for coach's assistance.
- d. Any variance of these guidelines will be announced on the firing line.
- 6. Dress Code:_Participants are expected to dress appropriately. Team uniforms or shirts with the use of the 4-H logo are encouraged, but not required. Both young people and adults should wear attire appropriate for the weather while remaining modest and socially acceptable. It is important that modesty be maintained in all shooting positions, therefore shorts must be of modest length: when standing straight, shoulders relaxed, arms down and side, fingers extended; the hem line of shorts must fall below tip of middle finger. If wearing shooting vests, shorts must extend 2 inches below the bottom of the vest. Tank tops with spaghetti straps, muscle shirts, bare midriffs, low necklines, or otherwise revealing clothing will not be allowed. Clothing with sexually suggestive wording or graphics; and alcohol or tobacco advertisement is not appropriate for youthor coaches.

All shooters and coaches should remember that their photographs may be taken or an individual be asked to interview for the media. Remember that you represent all of 4-H Shooting Sports - Make it a positive image.

Footwear required: No bare feet. No open toed shoes are permitted on the firing line. The footwear must completely cover the foot. Crocs, flip flops, sandals, etc. <u>are not permitted</u>.

7. **Disabilities/Special Needs** - In the event that any participant is physically incapable of complying with the general rules or specified discipline rules, the event staff will make every reasonable effort to accommodate that individual, allowing them to compete.

Any accommodation made must not jeopardize range safety. **Specific arrangements must be made and approved IN ADVANCE, prior to pre-registration, with the State Coordinator.** The Chief Range Officer must also be notified prior to relay on the day of the stateshoot.

8. **Scoring** for all air and small Bore events will be done by individuals recruited and selected by the Range Officers. Individual scores will be tabulated at the completion of each event. When possible, scores will be posted as targets are scored and tabulated. Please leave scoring personnel alone so scores can be posted as soon as possible. After targets are scored, youth shooters may review under supervision of the scorer.

9. Appeals/challenges

Scoring - Competitors only (not adults) may challenge their score in an event. Score keepers will not listen to an adult, only the shooter. The first challenge must be done **within 30 minutes of the announcement or final posting of scores**. If not satisfied after the ruling on the challenge, the shooter must immediately ask to appeal. That appeal will be handled by the Chief Range Officer and/or Chief Scorer. No scoring challenges are allowed after targets leave the official scoring area unless at the specified request of the range official or judge.

Other grievances should first be addressed to the line officer or range officer – by the shooter NOT by an adult. The Chief Range officer will make a determination on the grievance. A final appeal of a decision or ruling by a Chief Range Officer must be directed to the match director within 30 minutes of the ruling and must be accompanied by a \$50 fee. If the appeal is upheld and the decision reversed, the \$50 will be returned. If not, the \$50 stays with Missouri 4-H Shooting Sports.

- 10. **Spectator Interference**: Disruption or interference by parents, coaches or other individuals will not be permitted; this includes parents hovering over the scorers. Sanctions ranging from a warning to ejection from the grounds or disqualification of an entire team will be imposed for interference with the operation of the match or disruption of the events on a firing line or field. The "Little League Syndrome" will not be tolerated in 4-H Shooting Sports. Every effort will be made to keep these events fair, child-centered and positive.
- 11. **Coach Removal:** 4-H reserves the right to remove any coach from the range or firing line in the event that his or her behavior is deemed detrimental or distracting to their own shooter or others. Coaches should remain positive and supportive being careful not to disrupt other shooters. In the event that a coach is removed from the firing line, another coach may substitute for him/her at the discretion of the range officer.
- 12. Alcohol Policy: No alcoholic beverages may be consumed on the grounds during this event. Violation of this policy is ground for ejection from the premises.
- 13. Language: 4-H events are family events; language used by spectators, parents, coaches, or youth should always be appropriate for the family and youth setting. Foul language, cursing, rude/crude remarks are not acceptable and will not be tolerated. Range officials have full authority to disqualify, dismiss or bar from the competition and from the grounds anyone adults or youth using such offensive language.

14. No ammo will be provided for any disciplines.

Beef Fitting Contest Rules 2020

Wednesday – July 15 7:30 pm (following Lead Line)

- 1. The contest will take place in the livestock arena. All grooming supplies will need to be brought to the arena prior to the start of the contest. If for any reason the arena would be unavailable a secondary location will be announced prior to set up. Chutes will be lined up along the SOUTH Side of the Show Arena. After equipment has been set up; Parents, Guardians, other exhibitors not participating will need to relocate to the bleachers.
- 2. Only participants who are actively enrolled in the Beef Project category may participate.
- 3. Any Exhibitor receiving verbal assistance from anyone other than their partner will be disqualified.
- 4. Each team will begin with a clean, dry animal that has been clipped.
- 5. If exhibitors choose to use clippers during the contest, they may do so at their own risk.
- 6. Senior teams will have two members, both 16-21 years of age. The Senior teams will have 30 Minutes to Complete the fitting of their animal.
- 7. Junior teams will have two members, both 8-15 years of age. The Junior teams will have 30 minutes to complete the fitting of their animal.
- 8. Attire to be worn should be respectful of the standards set forth by the Linn County Fair.
- 9. Once time has been called, all teams must cease working on their animals. If fitting is continued after time is called, the team may be disqualified. The teams will be allowed a final comb-through of their animal before presenting to the judge.
- 10. The Judge may then take 5 minutes to ask questions of each team related to their animal, products, or fitting methods.
- 11. All rules are final with no negotiation until the 2020 fair has completed. If there is any requests of rule changes or additions it will be taken care of prior to the 2021 Linn County Fair.



2020 Linn County/State Fair - 4-H Exhibit List

- **1**. Items made by 4-H members should reflect the skills they have learned in their 4-H project, the needs and interests of the 4-H'er, and quality workmanship. Use the 4-H project literature and the "Clover" for ideas and criteria.
- **2.** Items displayed must:
 - Be made in the current year
 - Be the work of the 4-H members
 - 4-H member must be enrolled in the project
- 3. A member is limited to three (3) exhibits per class at the County Fair.
- **4**. Items are displayed at the risk of the 4-H member. The 4-H staff, Linn County Fair Board, MU Extension Centers and Missouri State Fair are not responsible for loss or damage to items.
- **5**. A member is limited to two items in the State Fair 4-H Building (all items in the 4-H Building have been judged as county champions and will not be re-judged) and one demonstration in the 4-H division.
- **6**. Judges determine how many Blue Ribbon entries should go to State Fair in each class. Exception being Photography, Cake Decoration and Scrapbooking because of State Fair limited space there are restrictions on how many can be chosen
- 7. The following items will be displayed in the "Library" at State Fair a special area that allows fair goers to touch and examine the items. 4-H'ers name and address should be permanently affixed to item.
 - Notebooks USE a three-ring binders with region, county, and youth name on the spine
 - Posters no larger than 14"x22" flat only; do not fasten 3D items to the posters name and address on back
 - File card systems

These items will be accepted from any project. Youths who show notebooks, posters, or file card systems should understand that their exhibits will be handled.

8. Where the item list states, "any item made," the 4-H member may display any item made in that project. This includes notebooks, file cards, photo displays, posters, or educational displays. Regardless of projects, the following dimensions must be used. Items, which do not comply with size or other specifications, will not be displayed or receive a premium or ribbon. NO posters, pictures, or patterns attached to projects. Scrapbooks made in projects other than class #315 will be displayed in the library.

9. Photography REQUIREMENTS:

- 1. Photos must be mounted on a rectangular 8"x10" solid mounting surface.
- 2. The preferred surface is mat board. It can be the color of the photographer's choice.
- 3. The photographs mounted on each 8"x10" mat board must be 8"x10" or smaller.

4. The mounted photo should be placed in a clear plastic 8 $\frac{1}{4}$ x 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ inch sleeve.

PLEASE NOTE: Solid requires that there are no cutouts (or other holes) in the mat board, either around or behind the photo (for example, a surface shaped like a picture frame is not a solid mounting surface). Sleeves are intended to protect these special exhibits from handling, dust and humidity.

 DIGITAL EDITING RULES For State Fair 4-H photography exhibits, certain types of editing are permissible and others are not. 1) 1. Altering (editing to change the contents of) a photo is **not permitted** for State Fair exhibits. • Examples include adding a sunset or object, removing someone from the shot, airbrushing to cover a bad complexion, giving a photo subject dinosaur eyes, etc. 2) Enhancing (editing to improve the existing qualities of) a photo **is permitted**. • Examples include cropping the photo, eliminating redeye and changing levels of saturation, brightness, contrast, etc. *Include name, address and county on the back of each photo. State Fair 4-H photography exhibit guidelines will be posted at http://4h.missouri.edu/statefair/main No more than seven (7) per county total.

- Educational display Educational displays (open faced card board boxes cut down) should not exceed 18 inches in height, 6 inches in depth and 12 inches in width. Can include three-dimensional items and must be free standing. (Posters with items taped to them do not qualify as educational displays.) Science fair display boards are too large (size 40 x 28).
- 2. Entomology or Geology Display Boxes Box must be no more than 18" long x 24" wide and 3 1/2" deep to fit in display racks (for State Fair). Plexiglas or plastic covers are preferred. No handles or knobs. *Boxes will be displayed upright in racks at State Fair*.

3. Scrapbooking

FOR COUNTY EXHIBITION – scrapbook exhibit consisting of at least three -2 page layouts or 6-single page layouts – no longer than 12" x 12".

For State Fair exhibits should be only 1 page 1 side representative of the complete scrapbook.

- Size not to exceed 12" x 12".
- All pages should be in clear protective sleeve or clear zipper bag. Do not frame scrapbook page. If more than one page is submitted for an exhibit (at State Fair), the exhibit will be disqualified.
- 4. Working Models These exhibits should show how things actually work (cutaway-sections of motors or computers) or can be used to help people identify parts such as parts of a motor or computer. Many times these exhibits are considered "hands-on" and can be handled by visitors. Working models should require floor space no larger than 14" x 22".
- 5. Decorated Cakes The use of forms or pans is recommended. Cakes should not exceed 13" in height or at the base. Cake boards should not exceed 1" margin on each side of cake pan or form and is considered in the 13" base requirement. Cake boards should be sturdy, especially if using a cake pan. The use of Styrofoam forms is recommended. Must only use Royal Icing, Rolled Fondant or commercial product (i.e. Dapp) that will harden and preserve the decorated cake. Cakes with candy decoration are allowed, however, avoid using candies that melts (M & M's, candy canes, etc.). (No real cakes, butter crème icing or tube/gel icing displays containing these items will be considered ineligible and will be rejected at the State Fair. Also cakes that have melting items will be removed).
- 6. **State Fair** Perishable items such as food, vegetables, crops and home grounds items will not be returned after the Fair. Edible vegetables will be donated to a charitable organization. These items are displayed in group settings not as individual projects.
- 7. State Fair Photographs of items too large or fragile: This category is restricted to: large items such as welding project or large woodworking items like furniture; fragile items such as delicate ceramic work. It is not intended as a substitute category for bringing or mailing projects. All pictures of projects should not exceed 5 x 7, should not be mounted on anything, and should not have multiple pictures. These photographs will not be returned. Do not send pictures of items that would be disqualified if sent to the fair.
- 8. **County/State Fair** Electricity exhibits using batteries such as circuit boards should not connect the wires to the battery rather the wires should be taped behind the battery. Another option is to not attach a battery but indicate "battery goes here." This is to prevent potential fire hazards.

- 9. State Fair All 4-H Building items must be checked in and out of the 4-H Building by State Fair 4-H Personnel during established times. (No exceptions will be made.) No early removal or checkout of items is permitted. Items, which are not properly checked in or out of the 4-H Building, will not be awarded premium money and/or ribbons.
- 10. **State Fair** No outdoor exhibit space is available. Please contact the State 4-H Office at 573-882-1441 prior to check-in for approval of large over-sized exhibits. Determination of items to be showcased will be left to the discretion of the 4-H Building Superintendent based on available space and the safety of fair-goers. Submitting photographs of these items is encouraged. A ribbon and premium will be awarded for the project.
- **11.** County/State Fair Shooting Sports exhibits should contain no live ammunition and arrow points should be removed.
- 12. **State Fair** All items must have a Missouri State Fair tag securely fastened to the item in a place that is visible to fair-goers. A second identification label is required on all items, except perishable items such as food, vegetables or crops. This label should give name and county of the 4-H member, and be placed in an inconspicuous spot. When an item includes more than one piece, each piece must be labeled with name and county. (Examples: jacket and skirt; rocket and rocket launcher; ceramic tea set; mittens, etc., should have an identifying label on each piece.) Textile items (clothing, knitting, visual arts, etc.) should have a cloth label sewn or safety-pinned into the item as a second label. Please remove all county or regional ribbons. Vegetable and food tags should be placed in an envelope.
- 13. **State Fair** Hams and Bacon will be dually enrolled in the Youth Class of the Country Ham and Bacon Class and may become eligible for sale if selected as Champion. The 4-H member is required to complete all Open Division entry forms which should accompany the project at check-in and pay the \$7.00 entry fee which is required in the Agriculture Building. Checks must be made payable to the "Missouri State Fair." Only 4-H hams and bacons should be checked in and out of the 4-H Building.

HEALTH CERTIFICATES

- A. The term Health Certificate means a legible record made on an official form of the state which shows that the animal(s) listed meet the testing, vaccination, treatment and health requirements of the state. A health certificate must accompany all animals to be exhibited as stated below.
- B. Animals with active lesion of "ringworm" with resulting loss of hair or "warts" easily visible without close examination will not be permitted to exhibit.
- C. Animals with clinical signs of an infectious or contagious disease will not be permitted to exhibit.

CATTLE

- 1. A health certificate is **not** required.
- 2. Brucellosis: No test or vaccination is required.
- 3. Tuberculosis: No test is required

SWINE

- 1. No certificate of veterinary inspection is required
- 2. BRUCELLOSIS: No test or vaccination is required
- 3. **PSEUDORABIES**: No test is required.

HORSE

- 1. All equine to be exhibited must be free of clinical sign of an infectious or contagious disease.
- 2. All equine require proof of a negative Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) test by means of the "Coggins" test within twelve (12) months prior to exhibition.

DOG

1. All dogs must have their vaccination records up to date.

POULTRY

1. All poultry animals must be test pullorum-typhoid tested negative just prior to exhibition.

SHEEP

- 1. Sheep must be free of clinical signs of an infectious or contagious disease
- 2. All sheep, including wethers, must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection or a paper copy of an electronic Certificate of Veterinary Inspection showing official identification (ear tag electronic implant or registration tattoo) as defined in Part 79 of the Code of Federal Regulations. If electronic implants are used for identification, owner/manager must provide electronic implant reader.

GOAT

- 1. Goats must be free of clinical signs of an infectious or contagious disease.
- All goats, including wethers, must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection or a paper copy of an electronic Certificate of Veterinary Inspection showing official identification (ear tag, electronic implant or registration tattoo) as defined in Part 79 of the Code of Federal regulations. If electronic implants are used for identification, owner/manager must provide electronic implant reader.

RABBIT/GUINEA PIGS

1. Rabbits/Guinea Pigs must be free of clinical signs of an infectious or contagious disease.

Any animal showing clinical signs of an infectious or contagious disease will be required to leave the fairgrounds by the request of the show chairman or the Fair Board.





Beef Show Rules:

1. NO BUTT FANS, STANDS, CARTS PORT-A-COOLERS ARE ALLOWED IN THE BARNS

- 2 An Exhibitor may enter only 2 animals per class.
- 3 Calves are to be lined up by the judge according to standing in class.
- 4. Farm Raised is defined as a steer raised on the premises where the 4-H or FFA member resides and was born to a cow owned by the family.
- 5. Health regulations will be as previously listed. The identification of each animal will be checked with the official health certificates, vaccination certificates, etc., which accompany the animals.
- 6 All beef steers must be owned or managed by March 1. All breeding animals shall be owned or managed by June 1.
- 7. To be eligible to show in a breed class a steer must have registration papers from the breed association and appropriate tattoos, or a certificate signed by the breeder listing the registration number of the sire and dam of the steer.
- 8 Bulls (1 year and older) must have a nose lead at **all times**.
- 9. Pens of 3 will consist of animals belonging to members in one club or chapter and at least 2 exhibitors within that club or chapter.
 - a). Three members will be needed on halters and no more than two (2) others are to set up the cattle.
 - b). No more than two (2) pens of heifers or two (2) pens of steers can be exhibited from
 - a
 - club or chapter.
- 10. Rate of Gain: Steers must be halter broke, broke to lead and shown in a class to be eligible to compete for Rate of Gain award. Steer must have been weighed in March to be eligible.
- 11. Carcass Contest: Only one animal per exhibitor and there will be a fee charged.
- 12. Animals must be manageable by exhibitor or they will be excused from the ring and not eligible for awards.
- 13. Cow/calf pairs: Calf must be born after January 1 of the current year. Senior heifers born after January 1, two years ago, will show in Cow/Calf class, as they should have a calf by side.
- 14. The point value of the division will be 30-20-10.
- 15. There will be weight classes for Market Heifers.
- 16. New 2018 Champion Market Steer and Champion Market Heifer will show against each other for a Supreme Market Beef \$50.00 cash award.




Beef Fitting Contest Rules 2020

 The contest will take place in the livestock arena. All grooming supplies will need to be brought to the arena prior to the start of the contest. If for any reason the arena would be unavailable a secondary location will be announced prior to set up. Chutes will be lined up along the SOUTH Side of the Show Arena. After equipment has been set up; Parents, Guardians, other exhibitors not participating will need to relocate to the bleachers.

2. Only participants who are actively enrolled in the Beef Project category may participate.

- 3. Any Exhibitor receiving verbal assistance from anyone other than their partner will be disqualified.
- 4. Each team will begin with a clean, dry animal that has been clipped.
- 5. If exhibitors choose to use clippers during the contest, they may do so at their own risk.
- 6. Senior teams will have two members, both 16-21 years of age. The Senior teams will have **30 Minutes** to Complete the fitting of their animal.
- 7. Junior teams will have two members, both 8-15 years of age. The Junior teams will have **30 minutes** to complete the fitting of their animal.
- 8. Attire to be worn should be respectful of the standards set forth by the Linn County Fair.
- 9. Once time has been called, all teams must cease working on their animals. If fitting is continued after time is called, the team may be disqualified. The teams will be allowed a final comb-through of their animal before presenting to the judge.
- 10. The Judge may then take 5 minutes to ask questions of each team related to their animal, products, or fitting methods.
- 11. All rules are final with no negotiation until the 2020 fair has completed. If there is any requests of rule changes or additions it will be taken care of prior to the 2021 Linn County Fair.



Bucket Calf Show



July 9 - Tuesday Horse Event

Class Definitions:

Halter classes are judged on the conformation of the horse. Exhibitor shows the horse at the walk and jog by leading on a straight line and then posing the horse in a square position with front feet even under the shoulders and back feet even under the hips. Judges are looking for the most ideal conformation for the age, sex and breed of the particular horse.

Showmanship classes are judged on the exhibitor and how they handle the horse while leading at the walk & jog and performing pivots (turns on the haunches) at various degrees of difficulty. Judges are looking for a seamless team of horse and exhibitor that works with minimal effort and is always in sync and step together. The judges also look at the presentation of healthy animals with grooming and cleanliness placing higher. Horses are shown in a clean nylon or leather halter and if a shank with a chain is used, proper attachment is required. Clean, well cared for tack will place equally as well as silver embellished tack.

Horsemanship classes are judged on the exhibitor and how they handle their horse while being ridden and performing a specific pattern of the judges choosing. Judges are looking for a rider that knows how to cue their horse to get a specific maneuver performed with minimal effort. Higher placings will be awarded to those horse and rider teams that perform together with attention to exact transitions and willing attitude.

<u>Pleasure</u> classes are judged on the horse and the way they travel at the various gaits being considered. Judges are looking for smooth riding, consistent speed and a calm, quiet and willing attitude. Slow and easy performances will place higher but not at the expense of the way of the horse travelling at his most comfortable pace within the gait.

<u>Costume</u> class is just for fun and open to whatever your imagination can invent! Of course, be sure that all components fit your horse and that nothing will cover his eyes or trap his legs and cause him to panic. Coordinate your own costume with your horse and again, make sure that your feet are safely in appropriate attire for leading a horse and that whatever you are using as the lead for your horse is safely and securely attached to his head. Be sure to try everything on at home ahead of time! Have fun!

<u>Boot</u> race is also just for fun! This is a timed event that will be 'run' in pairs. Exhibitors will ride their horse at a trot to the end of the arena and dig through the pile of boots to find their own, put them on and run back across the finish line. Handlers will take the horses back to the line for the participants.

POULTRY



Must be free of any symptoms of infection and/or contagious disease; will be subject to veterinary inspection while on exhibit. Chicken, duck, goose, and so on may NOT be entered in more than one class (exceptions noted). Each exhibitor can show up to two animals per breed per single sex/age class.

Rooster Crowing Contest

Rules & Regulations

- 1. Roosters (over 1 year) or cockerels (under 1 year) must be owned and exhibited in the Linn County 4-H/FFA poultry show by the 4-H or FFA member to be eligible to enter. Entries must be made at check in with the poultry show chairman.
- 2. 4-H/FFA members may "crow" only 1 rooster and they must attend that bird themselves.
- 3. The crowing contest will be held on Wednesday.
- 4. Birds may be brought into the ring "under cover" and not placed into the separate pens provided in the show arena until the beginning of the contest as signaled by the announcer.
- 5. A "counter" person will be seated next to the pen and the 4-H/FFA member. The counter will be responsible for counting on paper the number of crows by that particular rooster. Counters are provided by the Linn County Fair Board.
- 6. In order for a crow to count, it must be a complete "cock-a-doodle do" as judged by the counter.
- 7. The actual crowing contest will be a timed event of 15 minutes in duration. The rooster having the most crows during that period will be champion.
- 8. The 4-H/FFA member "handlers" may use any method within reason to get their bird to crow except touching the bird after it has been placed in its crowing pen in the arena.
- 9. In the case of a tie, the roosters will have a "crow-off" as decided by the poultry show chairman's discretion.
- 10. In the case no rooster crows, the prize money/ribbons will stay in the bank for the next year.

Sheep Show Rules:

- 1. All breeding animals must have been owned or managed by the exhibitor prior to June 1st, market animals by June 1st. Your animals must be registered in the breed classes that they are to be shown in and anything not registered will be considered crossbred. You must have registration papers to show in a breed class.
- 2. Registered animals will be required to have the association ear tag in at the time of the fair if the association provides said tags. You will be required to bring your registration papers so that registration numbers can be checked. You must have your private flock tag in also.
- 3. There are no minimum animal limits. (If you have an animal to show we will make a class for it.)
- 4 There will be maximum limits. They are: Each exhibitor will be limited to two entries in each of the individual breed classes and one entry in each of the group classes, except for the lamb and market class.
- Each exhibitor will be limited to four animals in the lamb classes and four animals in the market classes. Example: An exhibitor could show two lambs in the Junior class and two lambs in the Senior class.
- 5. The base date for computing the ages of all sheep classes will be September 1, but only those animals that have lamb teeth will be eligible to show in the lamb classes. Market lambs must also have their lamb teeth. Your Senior animals must be born between September 1 and December 31 of the previous year. Junior animals must be born January 1 and after of the present year.
- 6. The market lamb class will have a lightweight class of 70-99 pound animals, a medium weight class of 100-119 pound animals and a heavyweight class of 120 and up pound animals. Market lambs will be weighed at the fair and placed in the weight classes at that time. State Fair requirements for this class are different. Check your State Fair book.
- 7. All Market lambs must be slick sheared before coming to the fairgrounds, including all areas above the hock/knee and from the ears back.
- 8. Each 4-H or FFA member is to have his/her own set of health papers with only the animals that he or she plans to show. Please do not combine the sheep of brothers and sisters on one health paper.
- 9. Carcass Class—one animal per exhibitor and there will be a fee charged. Data will be taken the day of the show when it is convenient.

10. NO SHEEP ARE UNLOADED UNTIL THE SHEEP CHAIRMAN INSPECTS THEM.

Point value for this class will be 12-8-4.

"PEE WEE" SHEEP SHOW - is cancelled due to CoVid 19

BEST OF FLEECE

- 1. Purpose: the objectives of this exhibit are; first, to encourage the production of better wool; second, to stimulate interest in the proper preparation of wool for market; third, to select the best fleece in the exhibit.
- 2. Eligibility of Contestants: any Linn County 4-H or FFA member enrolled in a sheep project may then exhibit a fleece in the "Best of Fleece" exhibit.
- 3. Number of Entries: an exhibitor may enter no more than two fleeces.
- 4. Eligibility of Fleeces: in order to compete for prizes, each fleece must (a) have been shorn in the present year, (b) represent not more than 12 months growth except in the case of yearlings, which may have up to 16 months growth, and (c) fleece must be shorn from an animal owned/managed by the exhibitor.
- 5. Qualifications: any fleece entered in competition at the "Best of Fleece" show will be discriminated against if:
 - (a) tied with other than paper twine
 - (b) showing any paint or tar brand (soluble branding fluids permissible)
 - (c) showing excessive dung locks or tags
 - (d) discolored by excessive moisture
 - (e) cotted
 - (f) showing a weak staple or break in fiber
- 6. Preparation of Fleeces: the fleece will be tied with paper fleece twine, flesh side out, in a manner to allow their being handled without falling apart.
- 7. Point value for this class will be 9-6-3.




